Main Aims

- To develop and practice product writing skills by writing a short review of a movie they have seen.
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Comentado [CT1]: Accurate wording

Subsidiary Aims

- To develop and practice functional language related to writing movie reviews.
- To practice reading for detailed understanding in the context of a movie review.

Personal Aims

- To use clear, concise instructions that provide adequate STT.
- To manage time effectively so Ss will have sufficient time to write a movie review.

Anticipated Problems & Solutions

- Language problem: Ss might struggle to use the provided functional phrases in their own writing.
 - Solution: Demo by showing an example movie review that uses the phrases in context, assist Ss who ask for help with their writing by making suggestions, and provide feedback at the end about how to reformulate language and use the phrases.
- Time management problem: Ss might not have enough time to complete the writing task.
 - Solution: Provide Ss with a model to follow. Encourage Ss to not worry about getting things perfect.

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Procedures

Lead In – 6 min – S-S / T-S

- Introduce Ss to the topic of the lesson.
 - “Today we’ll talk about movies and write our own short movie reviews.”
- Ask Ss what are some questions to answer in a movie review. Elicit 2-3 answers.
 - “What information do you learn from a movie review?”
- Show the following questions on a slide:
 - What is the movie’s title?
 - What genre is it?
 - What is it about?
 - Is it based on a book?
 - Who stars in the movie?
 - Did you like the movie?
- Elicit meaning of potentially new lexis for Ss (*genre, based on, stars in*) and make sure they understand the questions.
 - For *genre*: “What do you call the type of movie?”. Provide examples: comedy, action, drama.
 - For *based on*: “How can you say that a movie comes from a book?” Mention that you can also say “based on real life”.
 - For *stars in*: “If an actor is in a movie, how can you say that in natural language? For example, Brad Pitt ____ Fight Club.”
- Ask Ss to talk in pairs:
 - Instructions: “Take **3 minutes** to talk in pairs. Choose a movie you’ve both seen and answer these questions about the movie.”
- Share questions in chat, then send Ss to breakout rooms.
- Nominate 2-3 students to share which movies they discussed.

Sample Analysis – 7-10 min – S-S / T-S

Layout:

- Share an example movie review with Ss, with attached questions.
- Ask Ss to work in pairs (using breakout rooms) to read the review and check whether the writer answered all the questions.
 - Instructions: “Work in pairs for **3 minutes** to read the movie review and check if the writer answered all the questions.”
 - Give demo: “For example, for ‘What is the movie’s title?’, we see it in the movie review here so we can check here.” (Highlight text and check box.)
- In OCFB, nominate Ss to answer 2-3 of the questions and explain where they found the information in the review.

- “[Name], did the writer say what genre it is? Which sentence do you see that in?”
- Show the review again on a whiteboard, and ask Ss how many paragraphs the writer used. (2)
- Elicit what information goes in each paragraph, and annotate the screen as they do:
 - 1st paragraph:
 - Movie title.
 - Genre.
 - What it’s about.
 - If it’s based on a book or real life.
 - Who stars in it.
 - 2nd paragraph:
 - What the writer liked or disliked.
 - Maybe a short summary.
 - A rating.

Language:

- Ask Ss to identify words and phrases used for parts of the review:
 - What is it about: “about”, “tells the story of”
 - Is it from a book: “based on”
 - Who are the actors in the movie: “stars as”, “plays”
 - Did they like the movie: “love”, “rate it 5 stars”
- Ask Ss if the language is formal or informal. (Neutral to slightly formal)
- Ask Ss if the review is mostly positive or negative.
 - “Exactly, it’s positive. If it was mostly negative they would not give it 5 stars.”

Writing – 15-20 min – S / T-S

- Share the student worksheet, which includes the example movie review with key lexis highlighted.
- Instructions: “Take **1 minute** to think of a movie or book you **want** to review. For example, *Harry Potter* or *The Matrix*.”
 - Ask 1-2 students what they picked.
- Instructions: “Individually, take **3 minutes** to write answers to the questions in the document for your **movie**.”
 - Give demo on **screen**:
 - Title: The Theory of Everything.
 - Genre: Drama.
 - Ask ICQs:
 - Which questions will you write answers for? (Questions in the document)
 - Are we working together or individually? (Individually)
 - Are we writing the review yet? (No)
- Instructions: “Now let’s take **10 minutes** to write a short review like the example. It should be 2 paragraphs and 35 to 55 words at most. Try to use some of the phrases we learned that are in **bold**.”
 - Ask ICQs:
 - How many words will you write? (35-55)

- How many paragraphs should there be? (2)
- How many minutes do you have to write? (10)
- “Try your best and don’t worry about being perfect. If you have any questions or need help with language, please send me questions in the chat.”
- Give 10 minutes for Ss to write their reviews individually.
 - Near the end, ask Ss to send their reviews in the chat when they’re ready.
 - Aside: For student Angelica, who is using a phone to attend the class and might have more technical challenges, tell her she can send me an email.
- As Ss send their reviews, upload them to a document for later review.

Feedback – 7-10 min – S-S

- Compliment Ss on excellent writing and ideas in their reviews.
- Instructions: “Now we’re going to check each other’s work in pairs, using a checklist.”
- Paste checklist in document, and go over it with Ss.
 - Give a demo using the example review. Ask Ss to answer a couple questions from the checklist. E.g., “Does this review include the movie’s title?” (Yes)
- Share checklist in chat.
- Give **5 minutes** in breakout rooms to check each other’s writing and give feedback.
 - Ask ICQs:
 - How will you share your reviews with each other? (In chat)
 - What will you use to check each other’s reviews? (The checklist)
 - “Great, see you in 5 minutes.”

Post – 5 min – T-S

- Compliment Ss on good writing and feedback.
- Use a document to go over a few examples of Ss’ writing.
 - Elicit from Ss whether items from the checklist are missing, and how to fix it.
 - Highlight 1 sentence at a time, where they made a mistake.
 - E.g., “What is missing here?” or “Does this review include the title?”
 - Ask: “How can it be fixed/added?”
 - Highlight errors and good examples of language and grammar. Have Ss discuss reformulated ways to write the same things more naturally.
 - Provide corrections as appropriate.
